#### Backwell Parish Council April 2024 Meeting

Councillors were delighted to welcome Phil Harris as a new Councillor. They wished him a long and happy time on the Parish Council.

#### **Bus Strategy Improvement Plan** (BSIP) Cllr Hannah Young who is

leading on this project for North Somerset Council (NSC) attended the meeting and gave Councillors a comprehensive update on the Plan. As a direct result of the large number of Backwell Residents submitting responses, the proposal to close Dark Lane at its junction with the A370 is being closely reviewed. A summary of responses will be available on the NSC website.

The decisions regarding the location of the Transport Hub and the related pedestrian footpath improvements will probably be made in 6 - 9 months.

**Planning** There is no date for work to commence on the housebuilding at Farleigh Fields.

There is no update regarding Rodney Road or the Gleeson (Nailsea) planning applications.

Grove Farm - Councillors were told that part of the planning application had be altered, requiring a further ecological survey. All those who submitted comments to the consultation will be notified by NSC and Councillors will discuss the new submission at a future meeting.

Even Keel: (Moor Lane). The Planning Officer has requested further information on access.

**Bristol Airport** The Airport now own the Airport Tavern. Once their intentions with the site are fully understood any issues will be reported to Councillors for debate. There has been an issue with illegal parking being set up on greenbelt land at Downside. This has been reported to NSC for action as appropriate.

**Biodiversity Duty** The Council wish to develop a biodiversity policy for Backwell. A committee of Councillors and residents will be set up to take this work further. A statement will be published on the Parish Council Website <u>www.backwell-pc.gov.uk.</u>

The Council has been in correspondence with Persimmon Homes regarding the plot of land at Farleigh Fields being offered to the Council as a green space. Councillors heard that there are numerous issues surrounding this offer, and there can be no decision at this time.

#### **NSC Consultations**

Parking Charges in Nailsea. Cllrs Harland and Taylor will draft a response on behalf of the Parish Council. Three-weekly collection of black bin rubbish. A key concern of Councillors was the impact this might have on residents who generate 'purple waste' (disposable nappies, sanitary items), particularly at times of hot weather.

School Place strategy. Cllr Harland confirmed that she had submitted a comprehensive response to NSC before the March deadline.

#### Other issues

CCTV. Cllr Ramos offered to attend a joint meeting proposed by Wraxall and Failand PCs regarding the CCTV at the railway station.

Phone Box. Councillors unanimously agreed to pass responsibility for the phone box on Farleigh Road to the Women's Institute for community use.

**May meeting** The next full meeting of the Parish Council will be held at the Parish Hall on Thursday, **2<sup>nd</sup> May** at 7.30pm. Please come along to see what we do.

#### Federation of West Leigh Infant and Backwell Junior School West Leigh Infant School

#### Reception (aged 5)

The children had a great time before the Easter holiday learning about African culture and art. We started the week by jet setting off to Africa on our class airline and looked at the globe of the world to find out where we were heading. We created beautiful silhouette pictures, inspired by safari sunsets, using special dyes to create a background and then cut out animals in black sugar paper to showcase the wildlife. We looked at a video of Maasai Mara children living in Kenya and had the chance to wear a real Maasai necklace that was lent to us by Mrs Bowden-Green, who lived in Africa. We used a paper plate to make our own necklaces and added paint, sticks, straws and pipe cleaners to create the bead patterns on the original. We were able to learn a special African dance with a dance instructor and move like a lion. A specialist music teacher also taught us an African song called Kye Kye Kule and let us explore the sounds of African instruments

#### Year 1 (aged 6)

Rabbit and Owl Classes enjoyed exploring the many art and craft activities inspired by the vibrant continent of Africa. Some of their favourite art work included Giraffe drawings with added Adinkra Symbols for a background. Sunsets across African savannahs were the inspiration for all year groups to practice their colour mixing skills. The Year 1 classes started with yellow paint and gradually mixed in varying amounts of red paint to create these amazing coloured skies. The children cut out some silhouettes of African animals to complete the African sunset scene. Rabbit and Owl Classes also learned about

Ndebele Art and how bold geometric patterns can be used to decorate houses and buildings. We made houses out of cardboard and decorated them with our own colourful Ndebele patterns As well as lots of arts



and craft activities, we also enjoyed taking part in African drumming and dance workshops. A great time was had by all. **Year 2 (Aged 7)** 

Year 2 had a brilliant week learning about Africa. We found out about the continent and countries of Africa, and the Egyptian Pyramids. We researched different African animals, and mixed primary colours to create pink and orange shades to create a sunset background. We chose



our favourite animals to sketch, copied them onto black paper and cut them out to create silhouettes against the sunsets. Some of us added Baobab and Acacia tree silhouettes to our pictures.

We had a drumming workshop and took part in a Lion King inspired dance workshop. We really enjoyed our music and dance.

#### **Reduce Water usage** and Save Money

#### Event

Please come to a free information stand at the Backwell Fairtrade Café in the Backwell Parish Hall on 11<sup>th</sup> May between 10.00am and 12.00 midday and find out how to save money on your water bill and also reduce your carbon footprint. There will be free water saving devices including water tap aerators, shower timers, children's "toothy timers", Buffaloo Cistern bags and for the garden, plant saving water gel. Water, we all need it and

use it. We can turn on a tap and get clean water and we know what it costs in pounds and pence to us each year from our bills. There is also another cost of water that is not so obvious, the impact on the UK Carbon emissions. Treating and distributing water contributes to almost 1% of total UK carbon emissions. To put that in context, that is the equivalent to the emissions of about one million cars.

#### Christian Aid Week 2024 – May 12th -18th.

Seven days, so many ways to make a difference. Every Christian Aid Week, people across Britain and Ireland raise funds, act and pray for their global neighbours in a celebration of hope for a fairer world.

This year's appeal runs from May 12<sup>th</sup> -18<sup>th</sup> and is focussing on the organisation's work in Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa. Heavily reliant on agriculture, it's also one of the least prepared to combat the effects of climate change, including droughts, floods and landslides. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges: more than 70% of the population live in poverty and more than half of children are chronically malnourished. Christian Aid has been working in Burundi since 1995 when it first offered humanitarian assistance to people surviving the civil conflict. Now, alongside local partners, the organisation helps establish Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs). These community-led groups mean people can save and borrow money, making small businesses possible, offering reliable and diverse incomes so families can eat regularly, get medicine when they need it, and build safer homes.

Thirty-five-year-old Aline Nibogora is the chairperson of a VSLA which supports some 25 families in a remote village, in Makamba Province. Aline escaped an abusive marriage only to find herself on the streets begging for a place to stay. Her life changed when she went to a three-day, Christian Aid-funded community workshop. With a small start-up loan, Aline began trading avocados and peanuts locally. She's now a grocery wholesaler and living on her own plot of land where she's building a home for her family. In the next five years she hopes to expand, so one day she can buy a mill. This will provide a source of income without the need to transport heavy goods over long distances.

"I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine, remembering it makes me weep. I could never have dreamed I would one day have a brick house and be a successful businesswoman, able to feed and clothe my children. This is a plan and I will do it; I am a woman who is an achiever." This Christian Aid Week – from May 12<sup>th</sup> -18<sup>th</sup> – supporters are

once more stepping up, knowing that every prayer, every gift, every action helps transforms lives.

There are seven days and so many ways to make a difference – whether that's church services, special collections, Christian Aid Big Brekkies, or even a Bible readathon. For those who like a physical challenge there's a new option for 2024 with the chance to take part in 70k in May. You can cover the distance in any way you like, take part by yourself or with a group, and share your progress on a dedicated Facebook page. Find out all the ways you can support Christian Aid Week by visiting the Christian Aid website.

#### **Costings:**

#### What could your donations buy?

£5 could buy a savings book for a member of a VSLA, setting them up to start their own small business and become financially independent. £30 would help a family buy two Jerrycans to collect water from the river to carry back to their farm. Jerrycans provide irrigation to crops, especially during the dry season, maintaining food production for the family. £50 would mean a vulnerable family can purchase a water storage tank. Water can then be stored for a few days rather than travelling to the communal water point, allowing instant access to water for washing, cleaning and cooking. £100 could help a woman set up her own small business with a starter kit; including money to purchase her first few items to sell. This means she could supply local grocery shops or restaurants with vegetables, set up a roadside shop, or buy maize to sell in bigger markets like Bujumbura. £100 could also help buy a family a bicycle meaning easier transport to school, quicker access to medical treatment in emergencies or support carrying produce from farm to market.

#### What is happening locally to Support Christian Aid Week? Together we can push back against the inhumanity of extreme poverty

Poverty is an outrage and robs people of their dignity and lets injustice thrive.

You have read about Aline Nibogora, a determined mother in Burundi who was pushed to the brink of survival by poverty. She suffered abuse at the hands of her violent husband and was forced to flee. He turned the community against her, and she lost almost everything. Separated from her six children, she had to sleep on the streets. She told Christian Aid, 'People forgot I was human'. With Christian Aid help, Aline turned her life around. Christian Aid has worked in Burundi for nearly 30 years and provides community-based training so families can come together to set up small businesses, bringing them food security, better health, safer homes, increased resilience and hope.

This year, we are not delivering envelopes to every household. However, there will be a supply of envelopes in **each church** in our area, also at **Parker's** Estate Agents, who will act as a **Collection Point**.

There will also be envelopes and an opportunity to donate at the **The Meeting Point** on Tuesday, **14<sup>th</sup> May.**

# An Exciting Day at the Allotments – Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2024

This day is an example of the power of a community helping itself- in this case the 85 Backwell plotholders who carry out much of the work on the allotment field, with a small committee. We are very proud of the attractive entrance to the field with wildflowers. White honesty flowers currently replace a derelict rubbish area, after transformation by the allotments team. Do use the footpaths through the field if you have the opportunity.



#### Car park, tracks and chippings

Our field has several areas where cars park, connected by tracks to enable access to plots for allotmenteers and for maintenance. The tracks are simply stone chippings on grass, which require additional chippings every so often to prevent them becoming muddy ruts. The allotments committee has no finance. When we require money for a notice board, new taps etc, Backwell Parish Council (BPC) pays, but we try to do as much as we can without depleting Council funds.

Within Backwell Parish, Tarmac owns the extensive quarry up Stancombe Lane, in Flax Bourton. It produces around 1 million tonnes of material every year. As part of a Section 106 agreement when planning permission was given, a community fund receives 2p for every tonne produced. The fund is shared between Backwell, Flax Bourton and Barrow Gurney. Twice a year a committee allocates the money, which goes to worthy causes. The allotments committee applied for 26 tonnes of stone chippings, via BPC, and our request was granted, for which we were most grateful. One of our team understands the world of chippings and we made sure we had Type 1, which has a mixture of stones and fine materiel giving a smoother finish.



#### The Kit

Access to the allotment field is tight and we could not cope with a big lorry of the type that frequents the A370, so we had to use a big tractor and trailer to make three journeys to collect the pile of chippings.

By great good fortune, one of our plotholders is in the world of earth moving, and he provided and drove his digger, and also a small orange dumper from a friend in Backwell, who was happy to lend it out for the day. No charge was made, which is extremely generous. (I did give him some surplus rhubarb after the event as a token of our appreciation!)



26 tonnes are a huge pile and spreading this thinly on the tracks and car park represented a big job to be done. A team of seven plotholders came, with rakes, at very short notice; this proved to be a perfect number to complete the task.

be a perfect number to comp Using his digger, the driver filled the bucket of the dumper, which he drove to whichever track needed chippings. He then moved very slowly backwards with the bucket tilting to allow the chippings to fall. This converted a bucket load into a line of chippings some 20 metres long. The rakers did



two jobs; working to encourage the chippings to fall evenly, and finally smoothing the line of fallen chippings.

#### Conclusion

The job was completed around 12.30pm, which was only possible by having the right kit, a skilled driver, and a willing team. I thanked the rakers for giving their time and energy to the project, which was mainly achieved in sunshine. One said, "I have had a great time with lots of fresh air and exercise and I have met a few new plotholders". The allotments are good for mental health as a result of growing food and flowers, and participating in a community activity for the field was also a great win/win activity.

At the moment, the waiting list for an allotment is short after a very wet winter.


The event is based at the Scotch Horn Centre in Nailsea where all routes start and finish.



council had successfully secured funding for, firstly, major route buses to go Electric; it is expected to include the X1 which should reduce pollution and noise on our busy road. 
#### St Andrew's Ladies Group.


#### Film Club


